Reunion 2021

Well, our 2021 29th reunion is history. NETWORK NOTES

As we move into 2022 and head for our 30th reunion next November, those of us who are Vietnam veterans have, for most of us, reached the stage of our lives where we are at, near, or beyond the average life span of all Americans. We are losing more and more of our members like Ray Nieto, John "Sugarbear" Burch, and others. The ravages of aging do not stop for anyone or anything. Mary Nieto's interment ceremony was a somber beginning to our reunion that should remind everyone what it means to gather with those with whom you served, no matter the circumstances. My personal experiences with our reunions began in 2000 and I have never regretted making the trek every year since. I was scared to death, not knowing what might happen at that first reunion, and how people would react to me or me to them. I shouldn't have worried. It was a great experience. This photo was taken minutes after I checked into the reunion in November 2020. It is of Lou Damiano and myself. We had not seen each other in more than 30 years and it speaks for itself:



In 2001 I insisted my wife, Nancy, accompany me. One of the moments I most remember and will never forget, and that stands out as a major event in our marriage, is what Nancy said, out of the blue, as we traveled on the New Jersey Turnpike on the way home after her first reunion in 2001. She looked over at me and said "I didn't know there were any other people like you". Leaving all details aside, that statement had a major positive influence on our already near 30 year relationship, and it happened because of our reunions. She is now as much a part of running this outfit as I am. If you are among those "younger" post-Vietnam Marines who are members of the 2/9 Network I can guarantee that if you have not already, the day will be coming when you will yearn to meet up again with those you served with. It makes little difference if you were in a combat unit or served during peacetime. I did not know Red Hill when he began his quest to reunite with those with whom he served back in the 1980s, but as Jim Murphy stated so well during his speech at our Birthday Dinner this year, this Network would not exist if not for Red. Notice Red did not begin his quest until nearly 20 years after serving with 2/9. After getting to know him his one major regret was that he did not do it sooner. Too many of his fellow warriors were already gone. I urge all our younger Marines to consider that entire story.
