## 23rd ANNUAL REUNION RESULTS 8-12 November 2015

# What an outstanding reunion! We had over 200 people at the Birthday dinner and more than 230 people in total show up at various times during the reunion. Of those 230 plus over 100 of them were 2/9 Marines.

This reunion included our observance of 2/9's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary deployment to Vietnam and undoubtedly contributed to the great attendance. We were also observing the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Mayaguez/Koh Tang Island operation. This year's Battalion Toast at the Birthday Dinner was in memory of the 2/9 Marines left behind on Koh Tang Island. It is my hope that this year's reunion will be just as well attended or even bigger. Preliminary information on this year's reunion will follow after this report.

To begin, we booked 65 rooms at the Marriott Residence Inn Rosslyn, in Arlington, VA, in our original contract with them. To make a long story short we ended up renting out more than 100 rooms there AND several more at the Marriott Courtroom Rosslyn a couple of blocks away because there were no rooms left at the Residence Inn. We also got an outstanding dinner deal at the Key Bridge Marriott Hotel. We could not have been treated better and our thanks go out to Debbie Crist for doing yeoman's (yeowoman's?) work to make this all possible.

The Residence Inn went all out to show us ultimate hospitality. We basically had everything in the building full of 2/9 Marines, their families, and friends. We had the

hospitality room 24/7 during the entire reunion. Despite our large numbers we had plenty of room for the group, including tables set up for our raffle items, 2/9 items for sale for fund raising (golf shirts, covers, long sleeved t-shirts, etc.) and still plenty of room for social gatherings (bullshit sessions?) Here's a photo of one of many gatherings, some of which went on well into the wee hours:



For the first time in many years the Wreath Laying Ceremony at the Iwo Jima War Memorial was plagued by rain. 2/9 represented at least two thirds of the people attending. The Commandant certainly noticed and promptly acknowledged our presence. He also joined us for the group collage photo shown below that only includes about 60% of the members present in the top half of the photo (one of our "glitches" I'll discuss below). The other 40% are shown in the bottom half of the photo, taken at the Birthday Dinner.



As mentioned previously, we held our reunion dinner on The Birthday at the Marriott Key Bridge Hotel. What an amazing evening that was. Henry Ostaszewski and I commented to each other what a great sight it was to look out over that enormous room and see so many of our fellow 2/9 members and their guests filling it up. The rain and fog dissipated at exactly the right time for us to have a glorious view right out the dining room windows on the 10<sup>th</sup> or 11<sup>th</sup> floor of the hotel at the Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument and Capitol Building. Beverages of all types flowed freely, the food was excellent, and the hotel staff treated us with greatest respect. We could not have asked for more. Dave Garner was our featured speaker, Bob Ramsey (in his outstanding evening dress uniform), officiated our cake cutting ceremony, with Bill Cote our oldest and Zach Crist our youngest Marine, and we held our raffle after dinner.

Henry and I also made some very special announcements during the dinner. Henry introduced Reverend Dean Crist as the official 2/9 Network Chaplain and I pronounced Mrs. Debbie Crist an honorary Marine of the 2/9 Network. Debbie and Dean are husband and wife and their son Zach was our youngest Marine. They have outdone themselves in assisting us in preparing for the reunion for several years, including making hotel arrangements, providing shuttle services to several points during the reunion, and serving as our unofficial chaplain during reunion events. They are also the son-in-law, daughter, and grandson of Ramon Nieto, a fixture at 2/9 reunions since the first one was held, who lost his fight with cancer last year. I would be remiss in not noting that Mary Nieto, Ramon's wife, has been a driving force behind what these young (relatively speaking) people do for us. Mary was also in attendance along with most of Ramon's family.

While it was an excellent reunion we did have two glitches I feel must be mentioned here, and I hope to get feedback from 2/9 men who attended the reunion.

First, the group photo and our photographer (Classic Imaging and Photography). Henry and I had originally planned to have the group photo taken in front of the Iwo Jima War Memorial. However, when we awoke to rain we had Debbie contact the hotel to see if they had a space where we could take the group photo prior to dinner. They said they did. However, immediately after the Wreath Laying Ceremony concluded Henry informed me the hotel had a "recalcitrant" group who refused to vacate the room we were to use in time for us to take the photo. That ended that with the hotel photo. We proceeded to take the group photo at the War Memorial, but nearly 40% of our Marines had left the area and were not aware plans had changed. Our photographer for the event agreed to take a second group photo just of the men who missed the photo at the War Memorial, thus the collage photo you see above. It worked out in the end. Hopefully, all of you who ordered one have by now received the photo album you purchased at the reunion. I would like feedback on how you feel about the album and whether or not we should employ the same organization for the reunion this year. I have had comments both good and bad from some. One Marine was very happy to have the album with all the posed photos identifying everyone by name. It is nice to be able to put a face with a name when there is such a large contingent. On the other hand one Marine complained that there were name misspellings and the photos were not of great quality. I must say we did not expect an unforgettable photo album for the \$25 paid for the album but would like as much feedback as possible so we can gauge how most feel about bringing Classic Imaging back this year. Our second glitch was far more serious. As we explained before the reunion our deal with the Marriott Key Bridge was to pay \$30 for the dinner, and that included **EVERYTHING**, including tips and taxes. Thanks to some generous donations from Network members we were able to offset some of the cost and agreed to pay \$5.00 toward every dinner ordered. I made it clear in a couple of Battalion Runners and in separate Reunion emails that we intended to depend upon the honor system and not have people pay until they got to the reunion or dinner. The Network had to have final numbers two days ahead of the dinner and pay for them. While we expected, and got, some last minute cancellations they were offset by the expected last minute requests to attend the dinner. We paid for 230 dinners at a cost to the network of \$6,900. Unfortunately, we had 20 no shows. That cost us \$600.00, and does not include those who informed us ahead of the dinner that they would not or could not attend. That was disappointing to say the least. As I'm sure just about all of you know the Network depends 100% upon donations to operate the website and run the reunion. Losing that \$600 hurt. We intend to hold a dinner again this year but have to take that into account when we decide how we will ask people to reserve places for dinner.

Two other quick notes. This year we had far more first time attendees than ever before. I believe all of them had a good time and renewed old friendships or made new ones. Many of them saw postings in Leatherneck Magazine, the DAV magazine, or the VFW magazine about the reunion and never knew we have been holding reunions, much less that we had a website. Several of these Marines do not use the internet and do not have email addresses. If any of you on the email distribution listings I have established to send out the Battalion Runner and other important information on occasion, and know of some 2/9 member who does not have internet access, please try to pass information along to them. I do not have the time nor the money to send hard copies of items to people in this situation. I will, of course, post reunion notices in all those magazines again this year, but spreading the word to those you know are in this situation is the best way to get the word to them. Thanks in advance to any who can do that.

Secondly, our trip to The Wall for our 2/9 Wreath Laying ceremony took place after dinner this year, as it always does. We had more men and guests go along this year than in all the years I have been attending the reunions. It was a solemn tribute to our lost brothers and something I hope we can build upon in future years. Obviously emotions run high any time you visit those who are forever young. Those who were there with us last November will know what I mean when I say I will do everything in my power to insure there are never again any misunderstandings at that sacred place.

## **Personal Note for Post-Vietnam 2/9 Members**

A few weeks ago I posted some information in both 2/9 Facebook groups. In one of them I received a harsh response from a Gulf War veteran of 2/9 who, in a couple of exchanges he initiated, accused me, and by association all Vietnam Veterans in 2/9, of excluding everyone who is not a Vietnam vet from activities, particularly our reunion. In my first response I tried to explain that we have been trying to get younger, post-Vietnam Marines more involved with us for some time. His response was more of the same.

Any of you that understand the treatment and ridicule heaped on Vietnam Veterans upon our return to the United States know that many were spurned by major veteran's organizations. There were American Legion, VFW, and even Marine Corps League posts that shunned us. It didn't happen universally and fortunately I was welcomed with open arms by my home town VFW post. However, it was widespread enough to become common knowledge among Vietnam Vets that there were veteran's organizations where we were not welcome. For a United States Marine 2/9 combat veteran to insinuate publicly that we Vietnam Vets are now following that same path is, in my personal opinion, pure bullshit!

Let me make something perfectly clear. The 2/9 Network is first and foremost a Vietnam Veterans organization. Red Hill started everything well over 20 years ago by starting out to look for a small number of the men he served with in Vietnam. That initial search for a few Marines has resulted in today's Network where we now have more than 2,600 members. Unfortunately a few hundred of those members are now in our Last Patrol. But, we have reached the point now where we have nearly 400 members who are post-Vietnam 2/9 veterans. You ARE welcome! We want your input. We want you to consider attending our reunions. We want to sit down and get to know you, tell war stories and lies to each other, and partake of beverages of all types with you. We cannot do that if you choose not to attend. I also understand the demographics involved with younger people. You have jobs and families and probably financial limitations that prevent you from spending the money required to attend a 4 or 5 day reunion in Arlington, VA. That is a fact of life. However, if there are those of you out there that don't attend because you feel we will mistreat you I have one suggestion. Try it, you might like it.

We Vietnam Vets are getting old in a hurry. Most are approaching or are already in their 70s. One of the things I did not envision when I took over this website nearly two years ago were the number of men I'd have to report as passing on, many that I knew personally. It is the saddest part of what I do. Someone before a hell of a lot longer is going to have to get seriously involved to keep our 2/9 family together. Gulf, Iraq, and Afghanistan vets are those who will have to do it. I have no illusions that I have the answer to how we would ever approach something like that but it's got to happen sooner or later. We are a Vietnam Veterans organization. There is no getting around that. However, there is room for everyone in the 2/9 family. I think I can confidently say that I believe I speak for the huge majority of 2/9 Vietnam Veterans when I say we care deeply about carrying on the traditions of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, 9<sup>th</sup> Marines. In the coming years we'll all have to work together to make sure we keep those traditions alive. How we could accomplish that is a subject for another time.

I hope sincerely that no one takes this as an insult. That was not the intent of my rant here. The intent was to try to make younger 2/9 Marines KNOW that we would welcome you anytime, anywhere. I didn't do it just because of some comments on Facebook. We want post-Vietnam Marines to know we care about you and consider you brothers! And to that young Marine who made the Facebook posts about Vietnam Vets – I challenge you to attend a reunion and then report your experience. I'll even guarantee I'll publish it in a future Battalion Runner – good or bad. I would venture to say you might leave with a different attitude towards we nasty Vietnam Veterans!

NOTE: Jordan Glover, a Gulf War 2/9 Veteran, administers the most popular 2/9 Facebook page and has attended many of our reunions. Jordan responded to the Facebook page that prompted me to write this and disputed the idea that had been set forth. Thanks Jordan!!!

## 2/9 Network - Website Message Forums

Any of you that visit our website know that we have a Forums button on the bottom left side of the home page. The forums are username and password secured. I have been puzzled because those forums are very lightly utilized. Maybe it's just because I'm an old fogey but I think the forums are an excellent method of communicating with brother Marines, whether you served in combat with them or met them through the Network somehow. I realize there are all types of other, more advanced, social media outlets out there, and maybe that is why there is so little traffic. Anyway, I wanted to offer anyone a chance who may be thinking about using them the opportunity to let me know so I can process your access. I have the usernames and passwords of most of you who have joined since I took over the website in April 2014, so just a quick note will get me moving. There are individual forums there for general posts, reunions (not just Network, but ANY Marine reunions), each Company, Gulf and Irag/Afghanistan vets, and more. I cannot open the forums to everyone since there have been far too many times when I've left the access open been flooded with spam postings. If you want access just send me a note, and a username/password if you have not done that before now. Passwords must be at least 6 positions. The forums do allow postings of photos and certain attachments you may want to share with others.

# DONATIONS

I hate this section! As has been mentioned many times over the years we do not charge anyone a dime to join the 2/9 Network. Everything we do has to be paid via donations. In past years those contributions have been diminishing. However, there is really good news. Donations up to and including those made at the reunion were outstanding. We received enough money to pay for the website and as I noted in the reunion section above, offset some of the costs of the reunion dinner. I could not possibly name all the people who helped out. That number is probably in excess of a hundred, and some donated multiple times. All I can hope is that you realize how much appreciation we have for those who donated! We have enough funding remaining after all reunion expenses to cover the website costs through 2016. If we receive anywhere near the number of donations received last year there is a great chance we will be able to further offset individual costs at the reunion this year. Any amount is welcomed. Just make sure you make a check out to me, and not to the 2/9 Network. I cannot cash checks made out to the Network. My address is 21 Moseley St. Billerica, MA 01821.

One final note. This year, for just the second time in the 15 reunions I have attended, an item on the display table in the hotel conference room was stolen. Both times were within the last 5-6 years and the items stolen belonged to the same 2/9 Marine. I have just one thing to say. Whoever did this is among the lowest of the low – a thief. We made an announcement at this year's Birthday dinner asking the person who "borrowed" the item, to return it. That did not happen. If I ever find out, or prove, who stole those items you will be banished from the 2/9 Network and never again invited to our reunion. Enough said.
